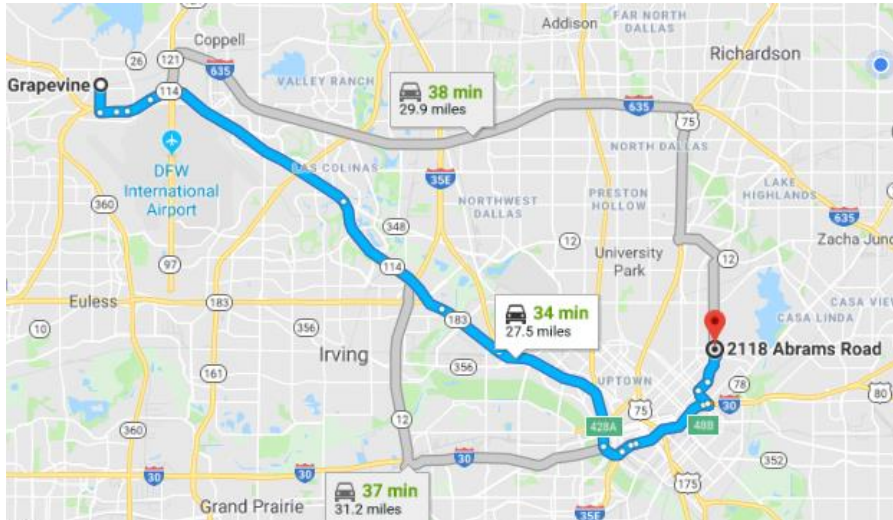


DIRECTIONS

NEW YEAR'S EVE START POINT – Palace Theater, 300 S Main St. Grapevine is located north of DFW Airport. From the south, take I-35 north to I-35W thru Fort Worth, then TX-121/114 northeast to the exit for Grapevine Historic Downtown (Main St). North to the Palace Theater on the left.

NEW YEAR'S DAY START POINT – Whole Foods Market, 2118 Abrams. From Grapevine, take Main St south to TX-114/183 southeast toward Dallas to I-30, then east on I-30 to Barry Ave (Exit 48B), then north on Mungar/Barry to Columbia Ave. Continue on Columbia which becomes Abrams. Continue on Abrams to Whole Foods on the right.

NEW YEAR'S EVE - GRAPEVINE

Grapevine is a small town but growing rapidly. It was founded in 1844 during the Republic of Texas days and grew into a farming community. Today it is known for its downtown historic district with many shops, restaurants, and museums highlighting the Grapevine – Fort Worth vintage railroad, the Nash Farm established in 1859, a Settlement to City museum complex, railroad museum, and many homes from the early 1900's. Grapevine goes all out with its holiday decorations and has much to offer.

NEW YEAR'S DAY – DALLAS SWISS AVENUE HISTORIC DISTRICTS

Start time: 9:00-noon, finish by 3:00 PM

The Swiss Avenue Historic District in East Dallas was developed in the early 1900's. It was one of the first areas which had deed restrictions specifying street setbacks, minimum size and cost of the houses and building material. The homes could not include rental units but did allow servant quarters and stables for the owners use. Many of these homes have been restored and sell for over \$1,000,000 today.

The walk continues thru the Wilson Historic District which features a collection of Victorian Homes, many of them used as headquarters for non-profit organizations.
